


Naval battle off the coast of Celebes during the Great Ambon War (1651-1656)






Tiworo Straits, 17th c. - amphibious hub, Makassar ally, haven for fleets, naval staging area





extended from near 17th parallel to the southeastern boundary of Khmer territories in the Mekong and Dong Nai river basins






Migration according to Austronesian language and obsidian distribution







Figure 2. Areas influenced or dominated by the Sriwijaya Kingdom at the peak of its power. Modified from Munoz (2006).






"Baixos" and "baxos" are early modern lberian terms for shoals or shallows.
